

New Hampshire's "I Am College Bound/I Applied" campaign is designed to encourage high school seniors to pursue post-secondary education and to assist them in navigating the college admission process by inviting them to submit at least one college admission application during a specified school day with the support of their school counseling office and local higher education professionals.

This campaign is part of the ACT's <u>American College Application</u> <u>Campaign (ACAC)</u>, a national effort to increase the number of first-generation and low-income students pursuing a college degree or other higher education credential.

High schools are invited to participate in the "I Am College Bound/I Applied campaign based upon a combination of documented higher-than-state average free and reduced lunch population for high school students, as well as a lower-than-state average college-going rate. While special focus is placed upon assisting students who would be the first in their families to attend college and students who may not have otherwise seriously considered attending college, each eligible senior at participating high schools is encouraged to take part in the event.

In 2019, this campaign was held from November 4 through November 20 and for the third year in a row, all New Hampshire colleges and universities offered free college applications to the students at the 50 participating public high schools during their school's event. Participating students benefitted from nearly \$170,000 in waived college application fees (this number does not include any existing free applications used by any of the state's colleges and universities). Additionally, each participating high school received one \$500 scholarship to be raffled and awarded to a participating student.

- "Everyone was helpful and there was no judgment on what school you applied to."
- "I was sitting next to the woman who would look over my application for one of the colleges that I am applying to."
- "Not only did I have a lot of help with the process, I was celebrated which made me feel good."

Our Volunteers Say:

- "When asked by his counselor why he was applying to only one school, a student replied, "Until today, I didn't expect I'd apply to any.""
- "This event really provides access to students who otherwise may not be able to afford college applications and helps students who may not qualify for fee waivers but still have financial need."
- "At WMRHS there was a student who was very apprehensive about submitting his 1st application. By the end of the session he was helping others with the process."

And Our Site Coordinators/School Counselors Say:

- "I have a student who is bright, intelligent and very capable but struggles with anxiety/depression. She was very hesitant to apply to college and had decided two weeks prior to "think" about applying to a 2-year program. She saw her peers applying during the event, and Given the excitement of the day decided (despite her fears) to take the leap and applied to Keene State!"
- "I have one student in particular who had a really rough time in his early high school years. I don't think college was something he even thought of as a possibility until the start of his senior year. Events like this help bring up the conversation within the school and he actually came to 2 blocks so he could have his whole application reviewed as well as his essay (he was over 30 words so one rep worked with him word by word to get it down to the 650). He's really excited about the prospect of going to college and has been super motivated academically this year as well as a result."

Looking Ahead:

Follow-up materials regarding completing the college admissions and financial aid processes were provided to participating students at each school's event, and students who opted in for additional electronic communications have been subscribed to The NHHEAF Network Organizations' Varsity Letter monthly e-newsletter to re-inforce the key next steps in the college admissions, financial aid and private scholarship processes.

It is our hope to continue to build the "I Am College Bound" brand across the state of New Hampshire. In addition to "I Am College Bound/I Applied", we will further our work to create <u>campaigns and initiatives</u> around "I Am College Bound/I Filed" to support FAFSA-filing efforts and "I Am College Bound/I Decided" to support decision day activities for all high school seniors. These three initiatives align with other national efforts to recognize these milestones for high school seniors.

Admissions offices at New Hampshire colleges and universities have been provided the names of participating students in this program who have applied to their institution for follow-up and hopefully, quick notification of college acceptances.

Many high schools immediately awarded their \$500 scholarship to participating students after their school's event. Other high schools will award their scholarships during their awards ceremony in the Spring.

Tracking students to college enrollment after high school graduation is imperative to the success of this initiative. We are grateful to GearUp NH for their partnership to help us track participating students through the Clearinghouse to determine how many enroll in a 2- or 4-year college the following year.

"I Am College Bound/I Applied" will continue to expand in 2020 to include the participation of five (5) to seven (7) additional New Hampshire public high schools. It is our goal to have all high schools, public and private, participate in "I Am College Bound/I Applied" by 2025.
